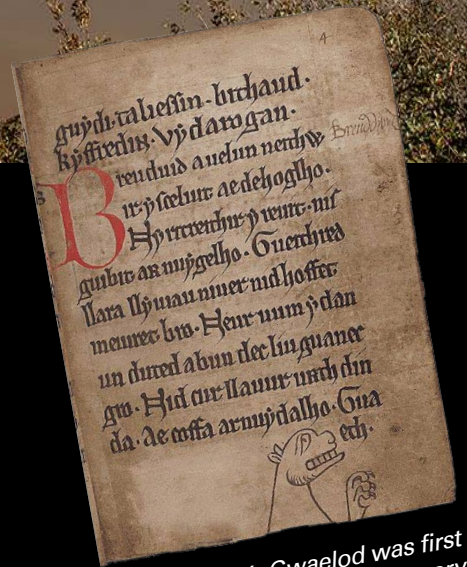


Responding to a dynamic environment – a long view of coastal and maritime communities of Cardigan Bay

The talk will explore historic changes along the coast and communities. Some of these changes are present in the Celtic myths of the Cantre'r Gwaelod; the submerged forests of Cardigan Bay, the erosion of prehistoric and historic landmarks and the loss of farmland. Using techniques drawn from archaeology, landscape history and physical geography past, present, future human responses to life within this dynamic coastal landscape can be explored. Through human engagement with this landscape, communities create historically situated narratives that offer a timeless alternative to the dehumanising logic of science.

The Cantre'r Gwaelod was first mentioned in the 13th century Black Book of Carmarthen, also known as Llyfr Du Caerfyrddin



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
